Alleluia, Christ is risen! A very happy Easter to you all.

Jesus is risen indeed. This a message of hope for everyone; there is a new start for everyone who turns to Christ and death is not final, but a new beginning where earthly values disappear, pain and suffering are no more and those we have loved are set free in God's Kingdom, where in God's time we will join them. Of course, I cannot prove anything, but I firmly believe that it is so! New life.

Every morning is a new beginning for us, a chance to begin again, to put right anything that didn't quite go to plan yesterday and to plan ahead in a positive way, rather than dwelling on past hurt or failure. Some mornings this is easy, at other times it feels an uphill task, but as long as I try, each day at least begins well; I hope and pray it works for you too!

That love was demonstrated graphically on the cross as Jesus died for us all, saint and sinner alike, himself without sin. His glorious resurrection is a beacon of hope.
